

## 5 Questions Every Math Teacher is Asking!

### 1. What am I going to teach?

- Prune your curriculum. You cannot expect to cover everything you've covered in the past.
- Set reasonable goals and be sure to consider the gaps created last spring.

### 2. How am I going to deliver the instruction and practice?

- Record your lessons even if you're teaching a live audience.
- Create a video library of those lessons for student reference.
- Model how to solve GMM skills as part of your lessons.
- Make viewing videos mandatory by including required examples or notes.
- Think small chunks of time when providing lessons, examples, videos, and assignments.
- Flip your classroom! Students view lessons at home and then practice together in the classroom.

### 3. How am I going to grade my students?

- Set clear expectations and guidelines.
- Keep it simple!
- Explore our exams, corrections, and follow-ups. You can allow students to earn points back with follow-ups.
- Use daily goals, assignment goals, worksheets, etc.

### 4. How can I still connect with my students and parents?

- Build relationships and trust.
- Set NON-overwhelming goals.
- Communicate a clear schedule of when students need to "show up" and when can they work "on their own".
- Set clear times when they can meet with you for help.

### 5. Will we survive this?

- Yes! Most teachers and students are strong, flexible, and resilient.
- Give yourself and others grace. Everyone is doing the best they can!
- Reach out and ask for help, we are here to support you!
